


The Friends of St James the Great, Thorley

The Friends of St James was founded in 1983 to assist the Rector and Parochial Church Council in maintaining and beautifying the Church and Church-yard.

The Church of St James the Great dates from Norman times and is the oldest building in Thorley. It consists of a Chancel, Nave, South Porch, Vestry and embattled Western Tower. The Tower is surmounted by an oak-shingled Hertfordshire Spike and contains six bells. The Church is built of flint rubble with clunch dressings and has a total length of 100 feet.

The Chancel and Nave were built in the 13th Century in the Early English style, but the Norman Font and Doorway suggest that the Church existed at least as early as the 12th Century. The Tower was added in the 15th Century. Outside the Western Door is a Holy Water Stoop and the Church contains three remarkable 14th Century stepped sedilia, or priests' seats.

In the Churchyard there is an ancient Yew Tree which has been dated as being at least 1000 years old.



The total money raised by the Friends since its foundation is now approaching the £100,000 mark. This has enabled numerous projects to be undertaken, most recently the restoration of the picturesque lych-gate, the first thing that catches your eye when you approach St James the Great from Church Lane.

The tower and many other parts of the Church now urgently require repair. An estimated £40,000 needs to be spent before the end of 2006, and another £20,000 over the following three years. The proceeds from this year's Festival will be used to augment the £12,000 the Friends has already been able to commit to help fund this work.

Music at St James

We hope you enjoy the musical activities throughout the Festival. We are blessed indeed in having so many people with musical skills amongst us. There are four groups dedicated to enhancing our worship by their musical leadership and combining together for special services and events.



In the early 1980s there was only the Church Choir, which sang at the main Sunday morning service, but the congregation was steadily outgrowing the capacity of the Church and the need for different forms of worship was becoming apparent. This resulted in the introduction, in the mid-eighties of the 9:15 a.m. service by the Revd. Alan Cole, Rector of Thorley at the time.

The <u>Church Choir</u> remained, until recently, with the traditional form of worship, but has now expanded its remit to encompass the Common Worship Morning Prayer service held in the Church at 11.15 a.m. on the fourth Sunday of each month, whilst still maintaining its involvement in Prayer Book Mattins and Communion services on the second and third Sundays of each month respectively. Choral Evensong [6 p.m. on the fourth Sunday of the month] and many of the weddings that take place at St. James are also undertaken. Material comprises all aspects of the "sung" services - hymns/songs old and new, anthems, canticles, communion settings, versicles etc. Practices are held on Wednesday evenings at 7.30 pm.

We introduced the latest addition to the musical family – <u>Jubilate</u> – in October 2001. This choir sings at the 11:15 a.m. service on the first Sunday of each month, leading the Common Worship Communion service held in the Church. It has been very exciting to see new people coming forward to complement the Church Choir. Practices are held twice each month, in the Church.

The <u>Music Group</u> was formed in the early 1990s to provide leadership for the more informal service held in the St. Barnabas Centre at 9.15 a.m. on the second, third, and fourth Sundays of each month. This group of singers and musicians undertakes a wide range of contemporary songs as well as a cross section of hymns under the guidance of Katharine Roper. Practices are on Monday evenings.


<u>St James Orchestra</u> under the baton of Anna Smith was formed in the mid 90s. Drawn essentially from the younger members of our parish family, with some adult back-up, the Orchestra plays for the "all age" Family Service held in the Barn at 9.15 a.m. on the first Sunday of each month. Practices are normally on the previous afternoon.

A brief insight into the life of St James the Great

St James the Great is the parish church for Thorley. The church building, which is Grade 1 listed, dates from the 13th century. It is thought to be built on the site of a more ancient place of worship. The large yew tree in the churchyard is over 1000 years old. The written records of the church date from 1539.

Since the 1950s the population of the parish has grown substantially, especially with the recent developments of Thorley Park and St Michael's Mead. The size of the congreg ation has grown too, so now a number of other buildings are also used. These include the St Barnabas Centre, formally a local Grade II listed 16th century tithe barn, which is used for worship services, church activities, and by local community groups; the Christian Centre built in the 1980s, near the Thorley Park Shopping Centre; the Church Room, on the north side of the churchyard rebuilt in 1994, where teas are served to passers by and visitors on Sunday afternoons in the summer. In 2001 the increasing need for space for our children and teenagers led to the Emmaus Centre, built on the site of an old Dutch Barn. This centre provides modern facilities for several of the children's groups, as well as other parish events.

Worship is a key part of the life of St James, with Sunday services in the church at 8.00 am, 11.15 am and 6 pm (second, third and fourth only) and at 9.15 am with children's groups and 7:30 pm (first only), in the St Barnabas Centre. Please check notice boards for other special services. There is also an informal service of Morning Prayer in the church at 9 am on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, and on Wednesdays at 10.00 am in the Emmaus Centre a service for parents and toddlers. In addition there are morning and evening house groups that meet around the town for bible study, prayer and discussion, as well as Mothers' Union, Teenage, Men's and Women's Groups.

For those wanting to find out more about the Christian faith in an informal setting with no obligation, there are regular Alpha courses.
